CONGRATS GRADUATES OF 2018

faculty, staff, student council, and class



TEMPLE UNIVERSITY COLLABORATES WITH SJBSM

San Juan Bautista School of Medicine has always been characterized by its active participation in community activities. On March 25-29, 2018, free health service fairs titled "Unidos Por Un Pueblo Saludable" were held in the towns of Patillas, Arroyo, Maunabo, Yabucoa, and Vieques. The fair was hosted by Lewiz Katz School of Medicine - Temple University, Greenfield Foundation, Academia Médica del Sur, and San Juan Bautista School of Medicine. The services offered included vital signs, glucose levels, flu vaccinations, OB/GYN services, cardiology services, basic dental examination, psychiatry, general medicine, and prescribing of medications as necessary. In addition, free food and several clothing articles were donated to patients visiting the clinic.

The contact for the mission trip was made in November 2017 at AAMC's annual meeting by Danilea Carmona, MS3, when Temple University students expressed their desire to organize the activity. She then referred them to Dr. Burgos, Dr. Miranda, and Dalilah Reyes, MS3. Danilea said, "I think these kinds of activities help remind us about those in need and how

we can make an impact. It also gives us additional motivation to reach our goals. In addition, working with entities that are not based in Puerto Rico helps us learn from each other's work and culture. Moreover, these hands-on experiences help us get real life cases that give us the space to apply our knowledge and grow beyond the written knowledge."

THE EFFECTS OF COMMUNITY SERVICE ON A MEDICAL STUDENT

Leading and participating in a variety of community service activities has been essential in my development as a medical student and has positively affected my point of view towards how to provide the best quality care. In this article I will provide examples about this, and the experiences will speak for themselves.

Hospital del Niño & San Jorge Children's Hospital - AESR

Pediatric patients who are diagnosed with cancer, genetic diseases, or other conditions that can lead to a disability can easily fall into depression or give up on themselves. But, if we use the right words and put ourselves in their shoes, we can probably get a big smile and even a rise in their motivation to keep on fighting. I promise that these smiles will be forever remembered. In this case, the experiences are mostly motivational, which is the first step in providing the best care since the patient's point of view towards their disease is the main factor in improving doctor-patient relationship and patient compliance.

Elderly home visits - Med Students for the Elderly

Unfortunately, a significant amount of the elderly population is either forgotten or treated as a thing instead of as a person. They are used to visiting the doctor and being identified as multimorbidity and polypharmaceutical cases. I feel my chest tighten every time I visit an elderly home and they cry saying things like "My family doesn't care anymore", "No one listens to me", "I'm forgotten", "I'm hopeless", "I feel like giving up..."

These visits have helped me view each case as a completely individual one and realize how important it is to understand the whole background and feelings of the patient before jumping to conclusions. If a patient feels hopeless and alone, they won't find a reason to get better. Sometimes they just need someone to sit down and truly listen to them. This is why we have created activities where we bring them music, memory games, physical therapy exercises, and spend time listening to their stories, while trying to make them smile. In this case, the main goal is to improve their quality of life.

Post-Hurricane Maria Community Clinics - Por Una Sonrisa

One of the experiences that affected me the most was going to the Puerto Rican community to provide medical relief after Hurricane Maria. Seeing low income patients, lack of treatment, exacerbation of diseases, and pain... a lot of pain.

My first patient told me specifically, "I just want to kill myself, I can't handle this disaster anymore." My second patient said, "My mom just passed away because she couldn't receive her dialysis after the hurricane." This was followed by a patient with uncontrolled diabetes due to his insulin being damaged because of the lack of electricity. And so on...

It is amazing when we learn the diverse and complex medical knowledge from our huge books. But the details missing from the books are only obtained through these experiences, and that's when one transforms from a "robot" into a humanitarian physician that is focused on treating the patient instead of the disease.





Educating and directly impacting underprivileged communities in Puerto Rico is one of the main goals of "Por Una Sonrisa", an association founded by Carolina E. Guerrero Díaz, MS3, who said, "It was the perfect opportunity to start helping communities in need around our beautiful island, and engage future physicians in activities that would enhance their commitment and empathy toward humanity."

As a collaborative effort with physicians and pharmacists working as a team to bring free health care clinics to areas most in need after Hurricane Maria, the first clinics were created in Yabucoa and have extended throughout different communities in Caguas. They have also worked with the public health association in activities held during the public health week, and have future plans with other associations.

SJB students and members of the association were able to apply their medical knowledge learned from books and courses and practice their physician-patient relationships

A total of eight medical students from San Juan Bautista School of Medicine embarked on a medical mission trip to Honduras with a group from the University of Toledo from February 24th to March 2nd, 2018. Their relationship with the University of Toledo started after the participation of the students in a series of free health clinics in Puerto Rico for areas severely impacted by Hurricane María.

Dr. Richard Paat from the University of Toledo and Associate Faculty at San Juan Bautista School of Medicine has organized this annual trip to Honduras for 20 years and has an extensive team of about 80 health professionals and students. He has invited the students of SJBSM once again to his next mission trip to Honduras from February 23rd to March 3rd, 2019.

During the last trip, the students visited the rural mountain town of La Esperanza to provide different health services for communities that normally do not have access to hospitals or clinics. Their tasks included serving as medical interpreters for the Spanish-speaking population of this region, organizing the clinics, and actively participating in the care of the patients.

"In addition to serving as interpreters, we also served actively with patients, in triage taking vitals, in the clinic taking care of patients, performing pelvic exams, doing ultrasounds, helping with tooth extractions, and we also gave workshops to the community leaders," said Dalilah Reyes, MS3.

Their participation was not limited to medical care, since it also included health education through different workshops

for the community. "We were a very valuable resource for the people and the staff from the University of Toledo," said José Alvarado, MS3. "We gave talks about different medical topics such as the parasites that were in the area, worms, CPR, how to build latrines, how to wash the food, how to prevent illness, and all of this we taught to community leaders who would later teach the members of their community."

"In addition to seeing the great necessity, it impacted me to see so many children, because as opposed to Puerto Rico, there are more children than adults," said Dalilah. "Also, we did not see any chronic diseases in patients; basically, it was all infectious because they walk all the time, their diet is very different, and they don't utilize medication practically."

Not only did the students participate in many clinics after Hurricane María and go on this medical mission trip, but they have continued their work of community medicine by founding the student organization, "Por Una Sonrisa". José Alvarado, MS3, said "The University of Toledo left us supplies, and those of us that had participated in the clinics created 'Por Una Sonrisa'. With the supplies that the University of Toledo left us and money from fundraising activities and donations, we have been able to bring clinics similar to the ones done by the University of Toledo to Caguas, Yabucoa, and Vieques."

Dr. Yaritza Inostroza-Nieves received a bachelor's degree in Chemistry from the University of Puerto Rico, Humacao in 2007 and a PhD in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology from the University of Puerto Rico Medical Science Campus in 2013. In August 2012, Dr. Inostroza-Nieves joined San Juan Bautista School of Medicine (SJBSM) as Assistant Professor and Chair of the Department of Biochemistry and Pharmacology. In 2016, she completed a post doc at Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard School of Medicine as a Research Fellow in Medicine.

She currently serves as Dean of Biomedical Sciences and Research at SJBSM and is in a research track tenured position. Dr. Inostroza-Nieves has been the principal investigator of the Abbvie Research Scholarship Program at SJBSM since 2017. She worked in the field of molecular immunology looking at the biochemical processes and signaling mechanisms in the immune system and has more recently become interested in the deleterious effects of inflammation in cardiovascular diseases (CVD) and potential therapeutics for these diseases. Her mentor, Dr. José R. Romero, is an expert on endothelin-1 function in signal transduction pathways involved in the development of CVD using in vitro, ex vivo, and in vivo models. Using the training provided by her mentoring team, Dr. Inostroza-Nieves will continue to gain expertise in inflammatory pathways involved in the development of CVD to identify new targets for the prevention and management of disease.

Dr. Maricarmen Colón-Díaz studied the role of epigenetic modifications including histone acetylation/deacetylation in the development of endometriosis during her PhD training. Her work, which resulted in three peer-reviewed publications, was one of the first to demonstrate that endometriosis has not only a genetic basis but also an epigenetic component. In 2012, she started at San Juan Bautista School of Medicine as an Assistant Professor in the Physiology Department, and she is currently the Chair of the Physiology/Pathology Department in a research track tenured position. She also worked on two collaborative projects with Caribbean Central University, focused on the detection of ER Stress markers using a proteomic approach in human prostatic cancer and microglial cells, and on the molecular mechanism of apoptosis.

At present, she has a laboratory at SJBSM and is working on collaborative research with Ponce Health Sciences University and the University of Arizona on the link between environmental factors and epigenetic reprogramming in endometriosis. Her long-term professional goal is to build an active research group with a focus on women's reproductive health, specifically on how epigenetic mechanisms, by interactions between genes and external factors, shape women's predisposition to suffer from diseases that impair their reproductive capacity.

Dr. Linda Laras obtained a bachelor's degree from the University of Puerto Rico (UPR)-Mayaguez and medical degree from the Valencia School of Medicine in Spain. She completed a Master's in Public Health, focusing on Maternal Child Health, and a Postdoctoral Master's in Clinical Research at the UPR Medical Sciences Campus. She also completed a fellowship in Pediatric Adolescent Gynecology at Boston Children's Hospital. Dr. Laras is a recognized expert in Sexual Violence as a health problem. She has been recognized by national organizations and the Puerto Rico legislature for her work. She has published many peer reviewed articles, and she has given multiple conferences. She joined San Juan Bautista School of Medicine (SJBSM) in 2016 as an Assistant Professor in a tenured track position and is Director of the SJBSM Puerto Rico Health Justice Center (PRHJC). The PRHJC is structured for translational research, development of new interventions, and improvement of outcomes.

Dr. Laras's work includes direct patient education and research services. She has a team composed of nurses, psychologists, social workers, community outreach, media communicators, criminal justice coordinators, and epidemiologists. She has a coordinated network of 8 Hospitals called SAFE Hospitals that provide services to victims of sexual violence. She recently obtained \$600,000 to develop a 24/7 Help Line, which will begin this coming winter.

She was an adjunct professor at the UPR system for two years. In 2017, she joined San Juan Bautista School of Medicine as an Assistant Professor and Chair of the Department of Biochemistry and Pharmacology. Dr. Delgado is in a research track tenured position and has vast research experience working in projects focused on the following: molecular modeling and electron paramagnetic resonance simulations in protein dynamics; development of nanoparticles design, glycosylation of proteins, lipid-protein formulations, and drug delivery systems for cancer therapy; and understanding the therapeutic potential of novel metal-based anticancer compounds.

She earned several prestigious fellowships, from the NASA Space Grant Consortium, National Institute of Health, and National Science Foundation. She is also actively involved in collaborative research with various investigators in Puerto Rico and the United States to contribute to the advancement of cancer research and reducing health disparities.
