On February 26, 2017, the LCME held their accreditation visit at San Juan Bautista School of Medicine. The first three days comprised a series of interviews and feedback from students, and the last day was a final interview with the school's President and Medicine Dean, Dr. Yocasta Brugal. A lot of hard work and preparation from the students and faculty went into the visit.

The student task force was made up by Lorena Figueredo, Pedro Rodriguez, Koby Bonilla, Vicente Covas, Shaun Marshal, Marimer Rivera. Gerardo Collazo, Dalilah Reyes, Danilea Carmona, and Fabiola Rodriguez. Their hard work paid off when the school received the official news on March 6, 2018, that its full accreditation had been renewed. "Being chosen to represent SJB was truly an honor accompanied by great responsibility," said MS2 class president, Koby Bonilla. "I am extremely proud of my colleagues and all the staff that worked hard to renew the accreditation."

AMWA PROMOTES AWARENESS OF GENDER BIAS IN MEDICINE

On March 14, 2018, the American Medical Women's Association (AMWA) Chapter President, Cristina Font, MS2, gave a talk on gender bias in medicine. Attendees took the Implicit Association Test, where the results revealed the unconscious bias the participant may have.

For the people suffering from the cognitive dissonance that followed the test, Cristina explained how the newly acquired knowledge can be used to make the conscious changes necessary to fight against our biases. "It's important to be aware that biases exist and acknowledge that everyone has them. This way, we can understand that the way we treat others may be driven by these biases, and we can consciously fight them to prevent behavior that contradicts our beliefs."

For years women have been underrepresented in medicine, particularly when it comes to leadership positions.
